The proposed project will include drilling of subsea development wells and use of up to two drill ships. A floating production, storage and offloading vessel (FPSO) will be moored and connected to the wells for production and will have the capacity to produce approximately 100,000-120,000 barrels of oil per day. Produced oil will be offloaded and transported to buyers via oil tankers.
