

## **EPA's Art Competition on Biodiversity**

Recognizing the potential of Art for learning, an Art Competition under the theme "We depend on marine life-Protect it" was extended to twenty selected primary schools in administrative Regions 3 and 4, for Grade Six students. Sessions were conducted for these students to sensitize them on the theme for Biodiversity Day, as well as the guidelines for the competition. At the end of the competition, a total of 55 entries were received from eight of the schools. Entries received were judged on originality, relevance to the theme (for the Art Competition), and creativity. The results of the competition were as follows:

1st place- Kizzan Henry of Den Amstel Primary School 2nd place- Keran Kester James of Sophia Primary School 3rd place- Saurav Moonsamy of La Grange Primary School

The students were awarded prizes of a \$20,000, \$15,000 and \$10,000 book vouchers for first, second and third place respectively. Ms. Henry was also awarded a trip for three to Splashmins Eco Park, compliments of the National Parks Commission.
